

### ***What if the person in my care has a physical difficulty in attending a voting location?***

Many voting locations have appropriate facilities to assist people with a physical disability to vote. A month prior to the election, those locations will be made available on the WAEC website or can be provided via a call to 13 63 06.

Alternatively, the person in your care can apply to be registered as a General Early Voter. The carer of a seriously ill or infirm person who is not in hospital can also apply to be registered as a General Early Voter. At the time of any election, postal voting material will be automatically sent to that person.



## **Enrolment and Voting**

### **Information for families and carers of people with a cognitive disability**



**The Western Australian Electoral Commission (WAEC) is committed to providing the most appropriate services to help all eligible Western Australians participate in the democratic process.**

The right to vote is a fundamental underlying principle of our democratic system of government. Where possible it is important to discuss voting with any eligible citizen who you consider may be capable of voting and understanding what is involved.

## **Enrolment**

### ***Who must enrol to vote?***

Commonwealth and Western Australian State laws require Australian citizens who are 18 years of age or over, and who have lived at their present address for at least a month, to enrol to vote for Commonwealth and State elections.

A person with a mental or cognitive disability capable of enrolling and voting must still do so.

However, if a person does not have the capacity to understand the nature and significance of enrolment and voting they can be removed from the electoral roll and disqualified from voting.

Enrolment for State elections means that you are automatically enrolled for local government elections.

### ***Who can determine if someone cannot understand the nature and significance of becoming enrolled?***

A registered medical practitioner needs to certify in writing that a person is of unsound mind and is incapable of understanding the nature and significance of enrolment and voting. They can do this by completing an Objection to Electoral Enrolment Medical Certificate form which can be obtained from the WAEC website or by calling 13 63 06.

### ***How can a person in my care check to see whether they are enrolled?***

Enrolment details can be checked on the WAEC website or by calling 13 63 06.

### ***What can you do if you consider a person in your care, who is enrolled, no longer sufficiently understands the nature and significance of enrolment and voting?***

Obtain the required form from the WAEC website or by calling 13 63 06. Return the completed form and a medical certificate to the WAEC at GPO Box F316, Perth WA 6841. The elector will be then removed from Commonwealth, State and local government rolls.

### ***What can you do if you consider a person in your care sufficiently understands the enrolment and voting system but they are not enrolled?***

Enrolment forms can be downloaded via the WAEC website or you can call 13 63 06 to have an enrolment form sent to you or the person in your care. Enrolment forms can also be picked up from an Electoral Commission office.

After completing this form, the person will be eligible to vote at Commonwealth, State and local government elections.

### ***Are there any penalties for someone who should have enrolled in the past?***

The elector will not be fined if they have failed to enrol in the past.

## **Voting**

### ***Who must vote?***

Voting in Commonwealth and State elections is compulsory for those who are on the electoral roll.

For local government elections, voting is not compulsory.

### ***Can a person in your care receive assistance to vote?***

Yes. Families, carers and all staff at voting locations are able to accompany and assist voters. Do not hesitate to ask polling staff for help if required.
